Biographical Information on our Guest Speakers

Lt. Colonel Charlie Zinger USMC (RET)

Charlie earned a Bachelor's degree from the University of Dallas and achieved the rank of Lt. Col. in the United States Marine Corps, retiring in 1992 after more than 23 years of service (eight-and-a-half active and fifteen in the Reserves). As an AH-1J Cobra pilot, he flew more than 100 combat missions in North Viet Nam supporting Operation MARHUK in 1972-1973 with HMA-369. His recruiting career began when he was assigned to Recruiting Station Dallas as Officer Selection Officer in 1977. His personal decorations include the Single Mission Air Medal, Strike/Flight Air Medal w/ numeral 10, Navy Achievement Medal w/ Combat V and Meritorious Unit Commendation among others. His recruiting career began when he was assigned to Recruiting Station Dallas as Officer Selection Officer in 1977.

Charlie Zinger has more than 35 years of business experience with small, medium and large sized companies in multiple industries. His primary area of focus has been in Staffing/Talent Acquisition, Recruitment Process Outsourcing (RPO) and Career Coaching. He has spent his last seven years as a Vice President with Career Management Partners (CMP), a boutique Outplacement Services firm based in Richardson, TX.

Prior to CMP, Charlie was Director of Employment & Recruiting – LOGCAP IV for DynCorp International, leading a team of recruiters and HR administrators in support of US Military operations in Southern Afghanistan.

Before DynCorp, he was VP of Client Services for Hyrian, a small RPO company, where he was responsible for the post-sales environment for RPO client/partners. Additionally, he participated in the business development process as a Staffing SME.

Prior to Hyrian, Charlie served three years as VP of Employment Services for Concentra (a \$1.1 billion Occupational Medicine healthcare industry leader), where he led a team of recruiters in filling more than 4,000 positions in one year while also managing complex vendor and client relationships.

Charlie's experience extends well beyond RPO and Healthcare. During his career, he has also worked as VP Staffing for two Fortune 500 companies (EDS – a major technology innovator, and ACS – a business process outsourcing company).

Although the primary focus of Charlie's business career has been talent acquisition, he spent ten years at EDS working in operations as part of the company's Call Center/Help Desk organization. As a Division VP, he lived and worked for three and a half years in Europe where he had EMEA-scope responsibilities for new business development, as well as operations oversight for six Opel Customer Assistance Centers in as many European countries.

Captain Kevin Oditt is currently serving as the Chief of Prevention at the Eighth Coast Guard District. Captain Oditt is a 1992 graduate of the U.S. Coast Guard Academy where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering. Captain Oditt's previous operational assignments include Coast Guard Cutter's ALERT and VIGOROUS, Marine Inspector at Marine Safety Office Port Arthur, TX, Chief of Inspections at Marine Safety Office Tampa, FL, and Chief of Prevention at Sector Long Island Sound, New Haven, CT.

Captain Oditt served at Coast Guard Headquarters in the office of Design and Engineering Standards, Port Security Directorate, Staff Chief for the Deputy Commandant for Operations, and Division Chief in the Office of Commercial Vessel Compliance.

Captain Oditt earned advanced degrees from the University of Michigan in Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering, and Manufacturing and the Marine Corps War College in Strategic Studies.

Don Payne Special Guest Singer

Don was drafted into the Army and reported to duty on 23 November 1963, which interestingly enough, was the day after President Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas. He applied and went to flight school (helicopter) in 1965 and served in Vietnam from June 1966-June1967, all with A Co., 229 AAHB in the 1st Cav. He was a Warrant Officer out of flight school and later received a direct commission in Vietnam, as well as a Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star, & Air Medal.

He has done several concerts for charities, friends/family, military gatherings, & especially on Veterans Day. If asked, he will tell you his motivation and satisfaction he receives from his musical talent is doing it for the veterans. However, they are the hardest ones to do as you can imagine, due to the camaraderie and experiences you've had with them. Emotions can sometimes come out. He will tell you that the best of all was when he was in Vietnam: "Naturally, in the Central Highlands, we had no entertainment, so I was it, good or bad!! Somehow, we found a guitar, and It was great for me to be able to bring a bit of music, fun & relaxation; that for a short time, took our minds off the war."
